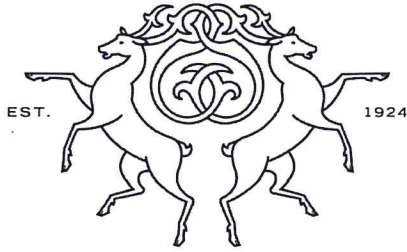

Dear Mr. Schied and Mr. Ingalls:

I am writing to follow up on our discussion that occurred at our March 12, 2014 meeting where I was encouraged by your remarks and attitude towards progress in our matter. It was my understanding that CBP would seriously consider the requests in our letter to try to collect the enormous amount of uncollected antidumping duties on wooden bedroom furniture from China and take action where possible. Moreover, I was encouraged to know that CBP would be updating its response to the Congressional Questions with more recent data. Such information and data would allow industry representatives, including myself, to monitor the situation and know that CBP was taking action to collect the full amount of antidumping duties legally owed.

I have been following the correspondence between you and my counsel at King & Spalding. Mr. Dorn sent an e-mail to you on behalf of the industry on June 19, 2014 that merely requested the information that you agreed to provide at our March meeting. I understand Mr. Dorn sent you a follow up e-mail on June 25, 2014, after we asked him for an update. To date, I have not seen any correspondence from CBP in response to either of Mr. Dorn's e-mails. I am disappointed in CBP's silence and lack of action since our meeting. This silence leads me to believe that, contrary to your statements at our meeting, CBP is not taking our issue seriously.

As you will recall from our meeting, I stated that when you ask for change and change does not come, what is the industry to do then? Moreover, I asked both of you what the industry should think if we are



back meeting with you in a year and nothing has changed. It has been over five months since our March meeting, and, from our perspective, nothing appears to have changed. The industry would greatly appreciate the updated response to the Congressional Questions as promised at our meeting. Can you please let me know when we can expect CBP to provide the information promised at our meeting?
